"We knew it would be like that, all the kids are good and the adults all get along — we're a really a community out here," he said. "We're hoping we can do this kind of clean up day every Saturday, or at least every month.

"And we'd like to see a movie

night, more BBQs or maybe a disco for the kids, just to reward the kids around here, then they'll look forward to it."

He said he everyone in the group photograph (above) grew up in Butler Bay which was built in 1995 as a subdivision.

"Next time we want to look at doing the main roads and down to the beach and park area," he said.

"We'd like to thank everyone who came and worked alongside us."
