"It is a means to an end for me because what I really hope is that other Bwgcolman might be inspired to go out and get aualifications and skills and to bring them home to community," she said.

skilled, and I loved to watch them work, to learn from them was profound for me and they really did set me on my journey.

"I draw strength from other Indigenous nurses, past and present, who work or have worked to improve the health of our people.

"I continue to walk beside them in the footsteps of those that came before us and I hope that one day my footsteps will guide others down this pathway for the betterment of our people.

"I would like to thank the Weekly Times and Harvey Norman for this wonderful award, it is truly an honour to receive."
