# Call for community to back NAIDOC celebrations

Palm Island's NAIDOC committee has been planning a series of informal events leading up to a Tribal Dinner in early December.

And, in keeping with the rest of 2020, this year's NAIDOC will be different, Coordinator Jennifer Ketchell says.

"This year's theme, 'Always was, Always Will Be', are powerful words that create a sense of pride," Mrs Ketchell said.

"They speak to the strength and resilience of our people, especially Bwgcolman, who have lived on our island home for over 100 years, and are the inspiration for our Tribal Dinner on Wednesday 2 December.

"We have come through a tough year as a community — COVID-19 has challenged us, we have mourned the loss of love ones and our lives have been changed.

"This NAIDOC we remember our Elders past and present, our families and what Palm Island means to us.

"We celebrate the gift of their lives and the sacrifice they made to build community for the growth of Palm Island."

She said they had been granted a small amount of money they wanted to use as widely as possible, to create events for all the community to enjoy.

"Bwgcolman Elders today yarn the story of how our Old People gave their time and talent freely, and worked together to create a community events for everyone to enjoy," she said.

"We want to follow in our Elders footsteps and encourage those who are involved in NAIDOC events

this year to give

their talent and their time freely, to make this NAIDOC especially memorable.

"Our aim is to honour our history and our present, to walk together, and to make some new tracks for our younger generation and teach them the value of building their own sense of pride in their community with their own hands, not necessarily with money."

Palm Island Mayor Mislam Sam

said this year's NAIDOC was an opportunity for the community to show the Elders their respect in a tangible way.

"This idea of taking a page out of their book and doing things the way they used to do them — without money — would mean so much more to everyone involved," he said.

"We want to spoil our Elders for the night after what has been a tough year for everyone, I hope everyone will hear our call, come together as one and make it a night to truly remember for its meaning."



We have made a lot of progress on the design of the Pregnancy on Palm Island (POP) mobile phone application, which can be used by parents throughout their pregnancy and beyond.

#### Where are we now with COVID-19?

More than nine months have passed since the first case of COVID-19 was diagnosed in Australia PHCC's Dr Francis says.

"Over that time we have seen more than 27,000 cases confirmed, and just over 900 deaths.

"We have done really well in Queensland, and particularly in our own community, but we need to continue working hard to keep the virus off Palm Island.

"The border to NSW has recently opened and it is anticipated the rest of the country borders will open before Christmas.

"This means we need to be more vigilant, and test early if we have even the slightest of symptoms."

Dr Francis said COVID-19 did not discriminate – it affects all ages, all races, males and females, young and old.

"In July, NITV reported at least 60 Indigenous Australians had been affected by COVID-19," he said.

"This was before the peak of the Victorian outbreak so this number may be even higher

"People as young as 20 have died in Australia.

"Lots of people, young and old, have been left with long term complications such as difficulty breathing."

He said it was more important than ever to get

tested early.

"If you have a cough or cold, a fever, sore throat, difficulty breathing,

change of smell or taste or just feel unwell like a flu, it is important to get tested," Dr Francis said.

"Getting tested means we can pick up the virus quicker, stop the spread and protect our community.

"It also means we can start treating you quicker and prevent long term complications and death.

"Finally, please remember to keep your physical distance, cough and sneeze into your elbow and stay home if you are unwell."



The Museum of Underwater Art (MOUA) is looking for members of the Palm Island community to volunteer as models for two new large scale sculptures planned for the beach area adjacent to the ferry terminal on Palm Island.

Sculptor Jason deCaires Taylor said the planned sculptures would be placed as a Welcome statement for arriving visitors and an invitation to explore the island and further underwater exhibits of MOUA in late 2021.

Models of all backgrounds, ages and genders are sought, ideally resident or with strong connections to Palm Island.

The selection will include one male and one female model of different ages.

The final sculpture will be inspired by the model and not an identical representation.

Once the sculptures are constructed | OCa |

artists will be invited to depict the history of Palm Island in the form of murals and engravings to adorn the inside walls of the structure. The aim of the final work is to portray the two individuals as Strong, resolute and proud.

As the sculptures gaze towards the ocean it is hoped they will represent **positive** role models for younger generations and an acknowledgment of the **past**.

Ten models will be selected for a preliminary scan to take place on Palm Island on MONDAY 30 November from 10am.

The final two will be paid for their participation.

The Process: Models will be required to remain still and seated for 5-10 mins whilst a 3-Dimensional digital scanning technician will circle the participant taking a series of high definition photographs of the face and back of head.

This process will be conducted in Palm Island around mid December for one day only.
