Extensive road repairs underway

Extensive and repeated damage has occurred to our sealed and unsealed road networks since the first major rains from Cyclone Imogen in early January 2021 the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council CEO says.



“Road damage can only properly be repaired when the road surface is dry and as we have had ongoing rain for 6–8 weeks, we have not been able to repair the roads as frequently or to the standard we would like,” the CEO said.

“The worst areas of damage have been repeatedly made safe through placement of gravel – such as at Esplanade and Dormitory Dr.

“This has worked for short periods of time as the gravel has remained wet and not settled with any strength however constant vehicle movements over these areas has broken up the gravel,

creating damage on damage.

“I appreciate we are all frustrated with the time it is taking to repair the worst of the damage.

“Where possible, we have fixed single potholes, such as on Main St, Clump Point Rd and Farm Rd, with an asphalt material that can be used while the surrounding area is wet.

QRA on board

“We have worked with the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) over the last several weeks to assess the damage and ensure we can carry out repair works in accordance with their requirements.

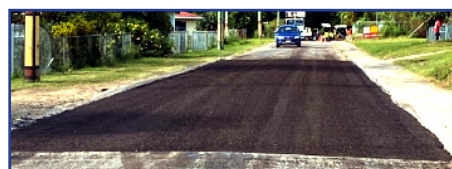
“That means we are not able to undertake significant repair work until it is approved by QRA.

“There are nine major sites on our sealed road network that have had extensive damage – I’m sure we all know exactly where they are.

“These nine sites will be prioritised for repair and it is pleasing to see all of the work happening over the last week along Farm Rd, Clump Point Rd, Mango Ave, Dormitory Dve, Luma Luma etc.

“There is more to come as we work through all of the damaged sites.”

ROADS

What are we doing about permanent fixes for the annual wash out of our roads?

We are aiming to progressively concrete as many of our roads as possible.

For example, we have recently applied for funds that will allow us to continue to concrete the Esplanade and Beach Rd from where the concrete is now to the intersection with Prior St.

As funds become available, we will concrete as much of our road network as possible – this is the only way we can prevent the annual severe damage to our road network from the heavy monsoon rains.

STORMWATER

The damage to our road network is mainly caused by storm water flows.

Unfortunately, a lot of storm water flows along our



roads, washing away the road surface and creating large potholes and full washouts.

During the recent rains we undertook some analysis of storm water flows associated with the worst damage to our roads, such as on Stanley St, Tarpaulin Dr, Mango Ave, Dormitory Dr, Luma Luma Dr etc.

This analysis showed that we need significant new storm water management infrastructure, especially at the top of Tarpaulin Dr and Sailor St.

We will soon be submitting funding applications to build new, and repair/upgrade existing storm water infrastructure.

We have also undertaken significant recent maintenance on our storm water networks, especially along Farm Rd and at Rodeo Grounds.

This will help to keep more water off our road network.

In addition, we have built three new culverts along Butler Bay Rd to keep the storm water off the roads to prevent damage.

It was particularly pleasing

to see so many locals get employed on the culverts work with nearly 80% of the workforce for the several weeks it took to construct the culverts being local people.

WATER & SEWER

The recent rains have also badly impacted the operation of our water and sewer network.

For example, our limited storm water system saw much more material than normal enter our sewer system, stretching it to capacity and in some cases creating temporary blockages.

To ensure our sewer system continues to deliver the importance service it does, we recently engaged contractors from the mainland with specialist equipment to come and clean out the sewer pits and pipes – over five days they cleaned all sewer pits ensuring they can cope with the further heavy rains predicted over summer.

The silver lining to all this rain is that our water reservoirs are full and completely free of any blue-green algae.

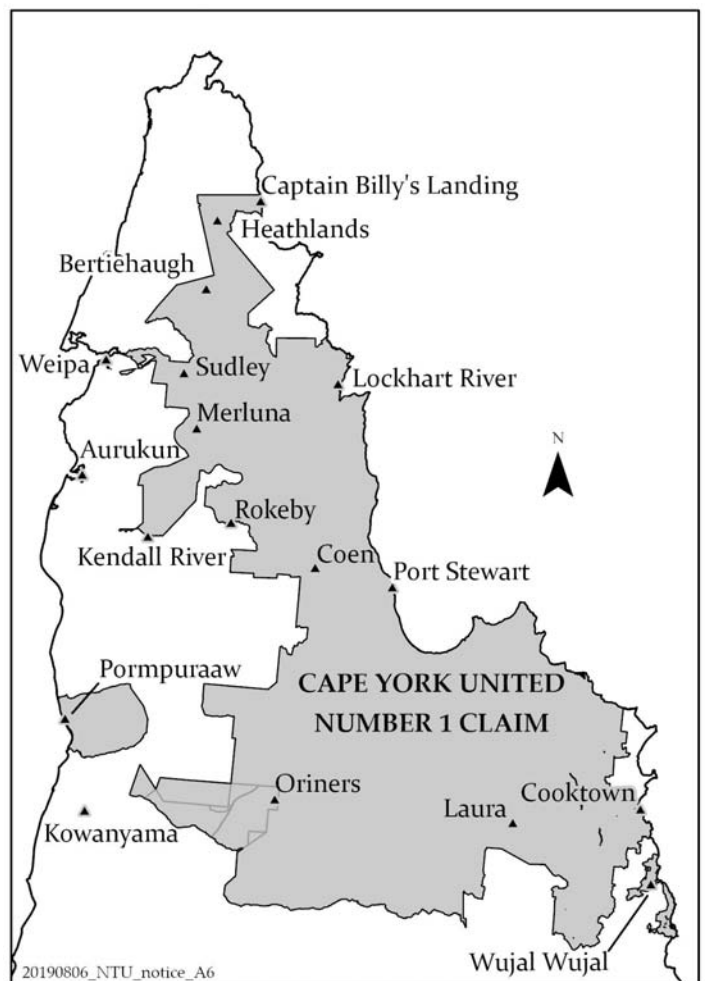

Townsville Hospital and Health Service Update



COVID-19 vaccinations are being rolled out across Australia.

Townsville nurses received their first dose on Friday 5 March and Joyce Palmer Health Service staff started getting their jabs last Tuesday.

Priority groups such as health workers and quarantine and border workers will be the first to receive the vaccine.

The Astro Zeneca vaccine is the one that can be transported to Palm Island and stored in our vaccine fridges - it will arrive in Townsville in late March.

The vaccination timetable will be distributed to community when firm dates are agreed. All people over the age of 18 years are able to get the jab unless you have reacted badly to previous vaccines.

You are encouraged to get the jab for the safety of your family, friends and yourself. It means the community can resume large events and not worry about the risk of getting the virus – all community members should be vaccinated.
