JT says 'respect what you have'

Vandals have struck again, this time defacing one of the '57 Strike rocks and surrounding footpaths.

The rocks were recently freshly painted (as reported in Issue 31 of the *Palm Island Voice*) by Bwgcolman School's Year 8 students and Lawrence Coutts.

The rock concerned (*pictured right*) was laid in memory of Sonny Sibley.



It now sits splashed with green paint; the concrete surround has been tagged with a number of children's names, as has the footpath. Council, in collaboration with the Palm Island Voice, is working on a respect campaign with high profile personalities to try and eduate perpetrators about the lack of thought – and plain disrespect – behind their actions.

Roadworks ready to go on water-logged Mango Ave

Palm Island
Mayor Alf Lacey
has announced
road repairs to
Mango Avenue
will finally go
ahead, possibly as

Mr Lacey (*pictured above with PIAC CEO Barry Moyle*) said part of the road will have to be closed to complete the work, which has been funded out of the Transport Infrastructure Development Fund. "Locals would have seen the gang getting around with the Thrifty truck patching and repairing some of the roads, this gang is the result of some of that funding," Mr Moyle said.

Mr Lacey said there were other jobs around the Island Council was keen to see progressed. "Many local people have been coming to me and complaining about the condition of Mango Avenue," he said. "It's about time that Council bit the bullet and fixed up Mango Avenue along with a couple of other roads in very poor condition including Mossman St, Cooktown and Bottlertree Lane." St



Mr Moyle said Council staff had been working with the Department of Main Roads to progress the roadworks, however the machinery required to carry out the repairs in Mango Avenue was expensive and not readily available.

"As a result of these difficulties Council has been looking for other methods to complete the repairs," he said. "We're now proposing to remove the bitumen with the grader and then with the use of a rotary hoe digging up the base of the road prior to mixing in cement. Once this is done the road will be rolled, creating a solid foundation and Council will then be considering various options to complete the repairs."

He said options included resealing with bitumen or laying concrete pavers with concrete intersections.

"While the heavy machinery and bitumen might be good, the laying of pavers could provide a greater employment outcome for the community," he said.

4 Ministers to oversee new Dept of Communities

No less than four Government Ministers have taken up the reins of the new Department of Communities in Queensland, a result of restructuring announced by Premier Anna Bligh after the election earlier this year.

Pauline Peel been appointed as the Deputy Director-General of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships which now incorporates the former Indigenous Government Coordination Office and Office for Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Partnerships, within the Department of Communities.

Ms Peel has circulated the following message through email and community networks:

There are now four Ministers who are responsible for the new Department of Communities:

- The Hon. Desley Boyle MP: Minister for Local Government and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships
- The Hon. Karen Struthers MP: Minister for Community Services & Housing and Minister for Women
- The Hon. Annastacia Palaszczuk MP: Minister for Disability Services and Multicultural Affairs
- The Hon. Philip Reeves MP: Minister for Child Safety and Minister for Sport

arrangements have also been announced for the service areas:

- Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Partnerships
 Pauline Peel (Deputy Director-General)
- Child Safety Services Judy Bertram (Deputy Director-General)
- Housing and Homelessness Services Bette Kill (Deputy Director-General)
- Disability Services Bruce Milligan (Deputy Director-General)
- Community and Youth Justice Services Kathy Dunning (A/Deputy Director-General)
- Sport and Recreation Services Craig Matheson (Deputy Director-General)

In the message Ms Peel also said Michael Hogan was the new Policy Transition Director, "ensuring delivery of the Premier and Ministers' expectations for better services, and drafting forward priorities for the new Department." "Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

"Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships will continue to work with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders and their communities to provide improved service delivery and life quality, support Closing the Gap initiatives, advance reconciliation, and promote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures," she said.

Bwgcolman students translate kids' book

A group of senior students at Bwgcolman State School have translated a famous children's book into "Palm Island Talk" reports Bwgcolman teacher James Ward.

The book, by Pamela Allen called "Who Sank the Boat" – now "Who Bin Sink da Boat" – has been translated into the normal language of Palm Island kids. This translation has been done by Tyler Kidner, Kaiya Blackley, Tessa Friday and Ella Morgan who made them into a PowerPoint presentation for use by teachers of the lower classes. As part of the school's 'Making The Jump' language program, the new presentation allows younger students to see the differences between the way they talk at home and the way they talk when they talk "school" or mainstream talk.

For example, part of the story reads:

Was it the pig (Was it da pig eh?)
As fat as butter (E big!)
Who stepped in at the side
(E be go step on da side – Em he go wangi)
And caused a great flutter
(Make dem fella all stress out)

School principals Leonie Betts and Andrew Shaw said this type of interesting activity had "got the kids on fire" and more translations of well-known stories and nursery rhymes were already in the pipline.

Other language projects include the writing of story books, that tell exciting yarns based on Palm Island and are full of local events and culture. These are being written for use in the school but with a lot of help and intput from the students and local people.

Banfield Dr closed again – for a good cause

PIAC is doing everything it can to ensure the community is notified about road closures due to public works — such as the current sewage upgrade project on Banfield Drive — says Deputy Mayor Raymond Sibley.

Cr Sibley, who holds the infrastructure portfolio for PIAC, said the sewage works currently being undertaken opposite St Michael's school have closed the road again.

"As a parent from the school I'm pleased to see this issue finally addressed," he said.

"Locals might recall a couple of years ago sewerage overflows into the school grounds of the School.

"It was a concern and had to be stopped." He said he was especially pleased the Council had won the \$725,000 contract to complete the works which would. in turn, create employment. PIAC CEO Barry Moyle said the overflows were mainly due to a design fault of the system directing the sewerage from Sundowner Ridge through the school grounds.

"Whenever there was any blockages in the system the sewerage would find is way out and into the school yard," he said.

"This was a major health issue and resulted in the State Government finding additional funds to address this concern."

He said last time Banfiled Drive was closed it was to reduce the risk of vehicle accidents on the range as truck transported soil for the airport apron upgrade job.

Cr. Sibley asked the community to be patient during the construction period as heavy machinery was required to work on the road area.

Eligibility Criteria for Adults

The provision of FREE DENTAL services to eligible people is a priority of Queensland Health.

In order to ensure public equity of access to the service, there are relatively strict guidelines regarding who is eligible for care.

One of the criteria is the person must hold a CURRENT HEALTH CARE or PENSION CARD FROM CENTRELINK. Please see Centrelink if you to find out if you qualify to receive one of these cards.

Do note that all school children up to Grade 10 are eligible.

If you DO NOT have or are ineligible for one of the cards then you will need to seek dental treatment elsewhere, you will need to go private or to TAIHS (Medical Centre) in Townsville.

We know that this raises issues for people who are ineligible and we would be happy to discuss how we could address these issues for you.

However, we are not in a position to alter the eligibility criteria for the service we provide.

If you do not have an appointment on arrival, one will be made for you People with an appointment will be seen first


Appointments can be made by phone or in person

Flossing technique:


 Take about 40cm of floss and wrap the ends around the second finger of each hand, leaving only a small piece between the two hands.





With one of the fingers in the mouth, draw the floss down into the gap between two teeth using a gentle see-sawing action until it slips just slightly under the gum level.





Wrap the floss around one tooth and use a wiping action to remove plaque and food debris.

The year nine class has been learning about portraits and chose one of their favourite music artists to draw.


The year ten class has been very busy this term with their first aid certificates and TAFE courses, but they have been exploring the theme of fire, in relation to the Victorian

Language language...WORDS everywhere! Miss Yolanda's grade 1 and 2 class has been doing great things with the story book they are reading.

This book is called, Dolphin Rescue. And it tells the story of how one dolphin saves its friend who has been caught in a fishing net. This story, or "text," is the means of having the children exposed to a huge amount of new words and phrases in School English. It is essential part of their build up to starting to do their own writing. The book was especially chosen as it is about the sea, a subject our Palm Island children already know a lot about!

Miss Yolanda is using the well tried and tested Walking Talking Texts program. This language acquisition program has been used extensively in indigenous schools in the NT and Qld for the last twenty five years. It really works!

The class is coming ahead in leaps and bounds and Miss Yolanda, and team teacher Miss Latoya, are thrillled with the program's success. They are using this story as the jumping off point for learning about sea animals, then they are comparing these beautiful known sea creatures with animals that live in other environments, such as forests.

Walk into this excitingly decorated classroom and you could soon imagine you were swimming underwater with dolphins and sharks or prowling through dense fores watching out for lions and elephants! The kids love it.



Here are some of the things the kids already know:

"Seahorses have spikes on their heads." (Maya)

"Dolphins can swim very fast and they can leap more than two metres out of the ocean." (Maurice)

"Dolphins are mammals, not fish. They feed their babies breasdt milk." (Shauntae)

"Seahorses have their babies live, not from eggs." (Stella)

"Seahorses are fish and they swim straight. Seahorse daddies can carry baby seahorses in a special pouch." (Craig)

"Dolphins swim in family groups called pods." (Duran)



Hey kids JT here I was gutted to hear that someone spilt paint over one of the **`57 Strike Rocks!** I saw those rocks when I was over on Palm last year, they were awesome!!
