State budget comes through

The Queensland Budget has delivered some important funding for the Palm Island Community, says Member for Townsville Mandy Johnstone.

Palm Island's share of the state coffers includes funding for jobs, police and emergency services, community services, housing, sport and education.

"The inclusion of \$5 million to construct new housing units and \$6.81 million for maintenance and upgrades will be a welcome boost to the local community," Ms Johnstone said.

"When I visited Palm Island recently I was really impressed with the amount of progress on the Island and I am sure I can work with Mayor Alf Lacey to form a partnership that delivers for Palm Islanders." Mr Lacey called on Ms Johnstone to support Palm Island's proposed retail precinct. "PIAC welcomes the State Budget, while some of the line items are funds that have

of been announced previously, es we welcome this money ce coming through," he said.

"I'll be lobbying for more money, especially for our State Member to support our proposed retail precinct, so we have that chance to participate in a real economy and get some real economic outcomes for our people."

Ms Johnstone said in addition to State Budget allocations, Palm Island would also receive funds from the Government's Sport and Recreation Disaster Assistance Program to fix the sports reserve, as well as Blueprint for the Bush money for enterprise development. Mr Lacey said upgrades to the sports reserve were important for healthy lifestyles.

"We believe more needs to be done for this type of infrastructure as well," he said.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS:

- \$1.09m to develop land use plans, policies and procedures
- \$1.91m to complete construction of a replacement Palm Island Joint Facility
- \$518,000 to assist in delivering the Palm Island Diversion Service, incorporating a community patrol, diversion centre (Sobering up Support Service), personal support service and diversionary activities
- \$36,000 to deliver the Coronary Health Improvement Project
- \$567,000 for Capital Grants for the Community Renewal program in the Palm Island Renewal Zone

Ms Johnstone acknowledged sport was an integral part in the lives of many Palm Islanders and fixing the Rugby League field would assist participation in sport and recreation activities.

"Palm Island's youth need decent sporting facilities to support them to lead active, healthy lifestyles," she said. She said the Council would also receive \$20,000 from Blueprint for the Bush to develop an enterprise strategy to assist future projects on Palm Island.



SWINE FLU UPDATE

Queensland is in the "Protect" phase of the response dedicated response continues to operate on level 7, Queensland Health building, **Charlotte St, Brisbane.**

Number of confirmed cases Queensland: 557 (up from 552 yesterday).

Number of confirmed cases nationally: 3858 with five deaths (3 Victoria, 1 SA, 1 WA).

Palm Island flu clinic is closed.

Protect phase information:

A main focus of the Protect phase is to protect the vulnerable and highrisk groups within the community.

Those most at risk of serious illness include pregnant women, Indigenous Australians, and people with respiratory disease (asthma, COPD), heart disease, diabetes, renal disease, morbid obesity and immunosuppression. These people should seek medical advice if they develop flu-like symptoms.

Indigenous communities set to benefit from new rent policy

On 1 July 2009, a new rent policy for Indigenous Council-owned housing will commence in Queensland's 34 discrete Indigenous communities.

This new policy is part of Queensland's one social housing system, which ensures that social housing rents are calculated and applied equitably across the board, no matter where people live.

The rents collected for social housing owned by Aboriginal Shire Councils, the Northern Peninsula Area Regional Council and the Torres Strait Island Regional Council, will now reflect the Councils' costs of providing housing.

It will help Councils to carry out repairs and maintenance, as well as upgrades to their housing stock.

So this is a better and fairer system, which will benefit everyone involved, particularly tenants. Councils' tenancy managers will work out how much rent is to be paid based on a household's assessable income and including any Centrelink Rent Assistance the tenants may receive.

Tenants will pay up to 25% of the combined

assessable income for their household, and this amount will not exceed the maximum rent that has been set for each dwelling.

Tenants will receive a letter from the department or tenancy manager giving them two months notice before a new amount of rent will be charged.

The Department of Communities will continue to work closely with Indigenous Councils to ensure tenants and communities are aware of the new rent policy.

The department has also developed a series of fact sheets to assist Councils and tenants to understand the new policy and explain in greater detail how rent will be calculated.


Local touch goes onto Main St buildings

Wow! Look at the jetty now!

Students from Bwgcolman School will soon be involved in putting the finishing spray paint touches on the new jetty artwork.

Teacher Miss Michelle from Bwgcolman School said the idea came from the children themselves and was supported by Palm Island Council and Queensland Transport.

"Early on in the year I took a group of kids to town for a tourism conference and one of the things that we did on that excursion was to go to and see visiting artist Shane Keenan and John Bradshaw working on another exhibition they did," she said.

"While we were there the young people said 'Oh Miss, this is deadly we should do this on Palm'.

"Then we were just walking down to the jetty one day and they said 'Miss we could paint the jetty' and 'look at the jetty it looks real shameful'.

Ms Michelle said she thought that was a great idea, so she took it to Deputy CEO Deniece Geia.





Ms Geia said the jetty belonged to the Government through Queensland Transport.

"She was very supportive of the project and I talked to Todd Chatterton and Leonie Betts at the school and they were both really supportive too," Ms Michelle said.

"Then I negotiated with Queensland Transport and so in the end they funded this project for the artists to come over and to buy all the paint and for Harold Wilson (Ringo), because we needed an indigenous elder to lead the project.

"We have negotiated for the students and the artist to do the spray art.

"Harold is going to come back and he will work over the next few weeks doing all the fine hand work.

"The kids have designed and cut all the stencils by themselves.

"The idea was also for them to learn a new art form skill and I think that has been very successful as a lot of kids have been really engaged.

"The community has been really supportive in getting this started, it was not just me, lots and lots of people helped me and that has been fantastic.

"I would really like to thank everyone in the community.

"I would also really like to say to the kids who write their names everywhere: could you just have a bit of respect for the other kids who worked really really hard for this?

"Just respect it, and don't write you name on it."

Palm Island Voice interviewed group supervisor Clinton Bourne about the work


they have undertaken so far.

"You are the best role model I have ever seen for youngsters," Knuth told the legend.
