Rodeo weekend set for take-off

Three truck loads of bulls will arrive by barge this Saturday for the second rodeo on Palm Island in 33 years.

There are 42 riders nominated already in the top divisions, with more than 40 are expected in the junior bull and calf rides.

Organisers Pauline and Shaun Shortjoe are confident that more than 3000 spectators will enjoy the action. "This year all events will be in the cool of night," Mrs Shortjoe said.

Riders from as far away as Cherbourg, Woorabinda and other communities are expected to battle it out for a huge Indigenous Shield on the Sunday night.

"It will be a great weekend with lots of Palm Island competitors and others from the mainland like Townsville," she said.

"There will be a small team still coming from Cherbourg."

Sunferries has catamarans travelling to Palm from Townsville on Friday and Sunday.

John Moss from Bucko Billy Rodeo Promotions will again run the events and will judge alongside Darcy Davidson.

"The bulls for the open bull rides and open will be provided by Grant Liversage from Charters Towers and Keith Poole from Townsville is providing the animals for the junior bull and calf rides," Mr Moss said.

"They will go over from Lucinda by barge on Saturday."

Moss said the angry bulls would vary in weight from between 500kg and 1000kg and would prove tough for all competitors.

Open bulls include Rampage, Stock Squad, Gun Metal, Sirius, Sister Fury, Little Bird, Romeo, Nasa, Telstra and Mexican Gunslinger.

Novice bulls are The Pig, Rip Curl, Merluma, Black Cat, Agent Orange, Black Magic, Hornet and Destination Unknown.

Once again the rodeo announcer will be Justin Price from Townsville and the shoot boss will be Darryl Tremlow of Brisbane.

"I am going over on Thursday and everything is looking great," Mr Moss said.

All Things Science

Science is alive and kicking at Bwgcolman Community School with students of all grades prodding, poking, investigating, examining, classifying, exploding, combusting and much more. Year 8 students passed their Bunsen burner licence and celebrated the event with a spectacular "Flaming Ceremony" (see photos below). Year 10 students took to the reef to identify coral species and other invertebrate animals. Primary classes dissected toads to compare the internal organs of a cane toad to that of their own. Year 8 and 9 students have also become very confident in identifying and using laboratory equipment precisely and safely. This semester will again see high school students learning about science as part of the curriculum provided at the school. Year 8 and 9 students will begin to study the physical sciences (Physics). More specifically, Year 8 will investigate the "forces" that control the universe and therefore our lives and Year 9 will be studying "energy" in all its forms. I hope to see more of the primary classes this semester as we try to promote the innate interest children have in the world around them.
