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Former Palm Island priest gives artworks back to community

When Catholic Priest Father Tony O'Brien MSC worked on Palm Island in 2005 and early 2006, he did an art course and painted many images of prominent residents.

The 77-year-old Father O'Brien created images of Reg Barry (*right*), Bill Coolburra (now deceased), Bernadette Johnson, Billy Prior, Mavis Foster, Kyppie Pryor, Doreen Morton and Elizabeth Doomadgee.

Recent floods and Cyclone Yasi have damaged many parts of the region, including Palm Island, mean the new apprentices will have plenty of work and learning to do.

Ms Johnstone visited the Island with Building Services Minister Simon Finn, and congratulated the two on being offered an apprenticeship with QBuild.

Two other QBuild apprentices in the 2011 intake were David Vanderjagt (Electrical Mechanical - Townsville) and Ethan Bray (Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Charters Towers).

Due to flooding and cyclone events across the state, interviews are still to be carried out for one remaining Construction Worker Trainee position on Palm Island.

"I wish them all the best in their future careers," she said.

Mr Finn said QBuild was one of the largest employers of apprentices in Queensland.

"QBuild received more than 3900 applications for this year's apprentice intake," he said.

"The skills the apprentices gain as they advance through their apprenticeships will give them a head start in the industry, equipping them with life-long trade skills that will enhance their career prospects."

On hand to give the two new Palm apprentices first hand knowledge about the job was well-known local footballer Ingai Geia, a second year QBuild plumbing apprentice.

Mr Geia was one of eight apprentice tradesmen in the 2010 QBuild intake of apprentices on Palm Island.

Palm Island Voice gaining popular recognition

"We would love to distribute the *Palm Island Voice* to inmates at the Centre," she said.

AMP laws up for High Court challenge

Late last month The Australian newspaper reported on claims by Palm Islanders that AMPs are racist.

In 'Grog bans face High Court test' (published on 28 February 2010) it was revealed that lawyers were busy preparing to challenge Alcohol Management Plans.

The newspaper reported a test case, "drawn from one of the hundreds of appeals filed in the District Court, will claim the laws are racist because the restrictions were imposed only on Aboriginal communities and not the entire state".

"The success of the nearly 400 remaining claims will depend on the test case being upheld," the report said. It said a similar legal challenge launched by Palm Island woman Florence was dismissed last year by the Court of Appeal. **Full story is at: <http://tinyurl.com/6kvz6nc>**

Post-cyclone recovery well on track

Queensland Government Community Recovery teams have been out in force helping Palm Islanders along the road to recovery since Cyclone Yasi crossed the coast in early February.

Department of Communities Regional Director for Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Services Greg Anderson said recovery efforts were established four days after the disaster to help ensure the community had access to vital support services.

“We set up a Community Recovery Centre at the PCYC on the Monday after the cyclone hit, so we could be on the ground to provide support to those residents who were in need,” Mr Anderson said. “The Recovery Centre is a one-stop shop for all the support services needed in the aftermath of a natural disaster. Through the centre here on Palm Island, around 200 applications for assistance were processed each day in the immediate aftermath of the cyclone. This resulted in payment of almost 500 Emergent Assistance Grants and around 100 Essential Household Contents Grants.”

Mr Anderson said the Department of Communities, in conjunction with its recovery

partners – Red Cross, Centrelink, Lifeline and PICC, also deployed outreach teams to visit homes.

“Outreach teams were out and about door knocking homes to ensure that everyone was aware of the recovery services available to them,” he said. “It also gives our team an opportunity to identify those residents in need of additional services and link them with our partner agencies. So far, our teams have met with the majority of residents during outreach operations and through the recovery centre.” Mr Anderson said outreach teams were still working hard to assess the needs of a number of residents.

“The weather over the past few weeks has made it difficult for our teams to get to some of the areas of the island,” he said. “At this stage it looks like outreach operations will continue on Palm for a couple of weeks, until they have been able to make sure that everyone has got the support they need.”

Kids urged to consider ADF careers

YOUNG Palm Islanders have been strongly urged to seriously consider a career in the Australian Defence Forces by 45-year-old Chief Petty Officer Ray Rosendale.

CPO Rosendale (pictured right with Palm Island kids last year) is an Australian Defence Force Indigenous Engagement Officer with the Fairness and Resolution Branch based in Cairns. The man, who is passionate about helping Indigenous youth gain good careers, was a key organiser for the rugby league game between the Australian Army Thunder team and local club Skipjacks for the Bill Coolburra Memorial Shield last August. His trip doubled as a chance to tell youngsters about the benefits of a career with the Army, Navy or Airforce. Earlier this year CPO Rosendale spoke at the biggest single intake of Indigenous people into the Australian Navy since World War II when 11 youngsters were enlisted at Townsville



on January 17. CPO said wanted his message to be relayed onto young Palm Islanders. "This is the biggest intake of Indigenous men and women into the Navy since World War 11 and this has been set up as part of the Closing the Gap Scheme," he said. "The Navy is a great career, recruits will get to see Australia and the world, get good pay, and free medical." On Palm Island, CPO Rosendale was popular with

kids as he handed out gifts and told them about some of his experiences. "I have been in the services for 20 years and you get good pay, training, to travel and lots of other benefits," he said. He said he couldn't wait to get back to Palm for the fourth game when he will continue his ongoing campaign to persuade Palm Island youth to consider a career in Defence.

Gold Coast reward for committed Year 6s & 7s



A group of Palm Island primary school students has taken part in a wellbeing camp on the Gold Coast as part of a truancy program which encourages school attendance on all days of the school week, and is also for children who have shown commitment to their schooling.

The trip was made possible by a special sponsorship from West Wing Aviation.

Students from both Palm Island Schools were chosen under the truancy program which is supported by Cottage By The Sea – an empowering camp supporting children to develop their mind, body and wellbeing working in conjunction with the Cathy Freeman Foundation.

Students learned how to grow self-esteem and make and sustain new friendships while living in a healthy, exciting and positive environment at the Twin Towns Resort in Coolangatta.

“The opportunity to experience something like this isn’t very common for the students on Palm Island,” he said.

“It is quite amazing, this is such an incredible way for us at the school to reward consistent good behaviour, but it is so incredibly hard to pick which students get to take the trip.

“We are fortunate to be given two opportunities this year for students, the second trip will be later in the year and we are taking a group of students to the snow, which will just be mind blowing.”

West Wing Aviation Townsville Base Manager, Christine Rice said they were pleased to be a part of the program.

“We are always pleased to get behind these life changing initiatives and offer assistance where and when we can,” she said.

“We hope the children enjoy their trip.”

Cyclone Yasi impacts on the Great Barrier Reef assessed

Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA) and Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service marine specialists have returned from their initial surveys to assess the damage caused to the Great Barrier Reef by cyclone Yasi.

About 13 per cent of the Great Barrier Reef, from Cairns to Townsville, was exposed to Yasi's destructive winds. Scientists have conducted rapid assessments of 36 reefs in this region to ascertain the extent of the damage. "The good news is that the damage

to these reefs has been patchy," GBRMPA's assessment coordinator Dr Paul Marshall said. "In some instances, neighbouring reefs and coral structures have remained relatively unharmed. These surviving corals will help the damaged areas to rebuild."

"It is always great to catch up with everybody on Palm Island where I have two



sisters and lots more relatives and heaps of friends," Lynette said.

Cousin Gertie Richardson from Palm Island is a regular, as are two other cousins in Sophie Richardson from Palm and Veronica Richardson from Woorabinda.

"Myself, Sophie and Veronica are all aged 41 so we have a lot to yarn about," Lynette said. Lincoln's mother was the late Burma Poynter who was a well-known and respected

elder on Palm Island.

Known affectionately as "Burma Rose" she had lived on Palm Island for more than 50 years.

Has your not-for-profit organisation or business suffered damage caused by Tropical Cyclone Yasi?

The Queensland Government has a range of financial assistance, support services and advice available to assist small businesses, primary producers and not-for profit organisations/charities affected by Tropical Cyclone Yasi on Palm Island.

Organisations directly affected by Tropical Cyclone Yasi may be eligible for recovery grants administered by the Queensland Rural Adjustment Authority (QRAA).

Tier-one grants of up to \$5000 are immediately available. You must provide proof that you have suffered damage as a direct result of the cyclone.

Tier-two grants of up to \$20,000 are available to help eligible organisations to recover costs paid to repair direct cyclone damage. Grants will be provided on proof of expenditure.

If you are unable to pay for costs to be incurred, financial hardship provisions are available.

Low-interest loans are also available to eligible organisations to fund the repair and /or replacement of damaged plant and equipment, buildings or stock.

My heart is now your home.



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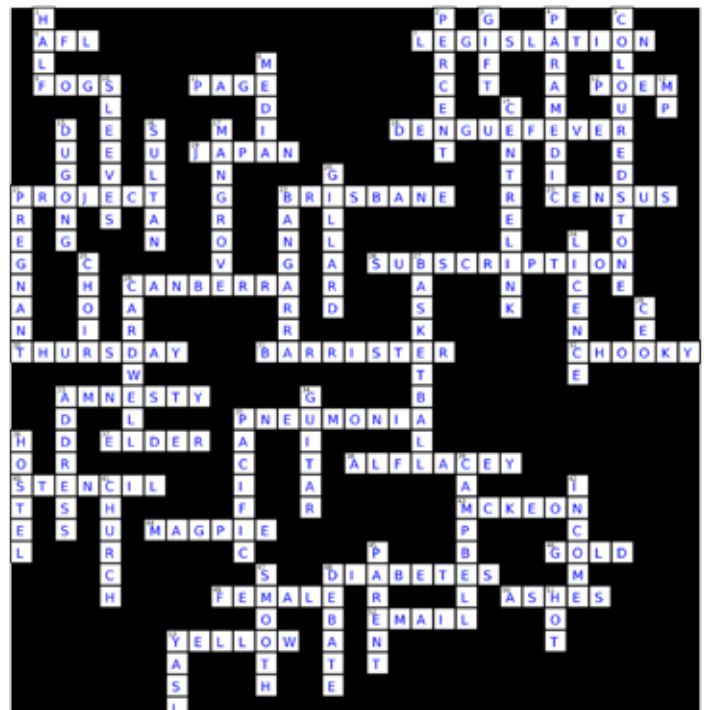

PIRL PLAYER PROFILE: Fred Haines Jnr

***IN the lead up to, and throughout the footy season this year Palm Island Voice will profile a local Palm Island Rugby League player each fortnight...
...who will be next??!***

Apparently destined to follow in his father's footsteps, last year rising young north Queensland rugby league star Fred Haines Jnr played for winning sides in Queensland's three biggest Allblacks carnivals.

Some feel Fred jnr may be the youngest Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islanders ever to achieve such a feat and it was in a short four month period between October 2010 and late January. Even more unique is that the sides Fred junior shone for went through each of the carnivals undefeated. The 18-year-old Haines starred for Curacoa Crusaders which won the 4th Annual CQID Indigenous Rugby League Reconciliation Carnival in Rockhampton from 22nd to 24th January.

Gifted Haines was named best back of the 18 team Rockhampton carnival, highest point scorer and was also made the elite squad of players selected from the 18 competing sides. Last October, Haines also played for the Cherbourg Hornets side which scored a 28-20 victory over powerful Torres Strait Islander side Kulpiyam in the grand final of Queensland's biggest Aboriginal Allblacks carnival in Cairns. Only a week earlier Haines shone for Curacoa Crusaders which defeated the Palm Island Barracudas 37-6 in the grand final of the Bindal Sharks Allblacks carnival in Townsville. He said the hardest carnival of the three was hard to choose.

"It would have been the Cairns All Blacks when playing for Cherbourg," he said.

"The Torres Strait Islander teams are the hardest ones to beat along with Yarrabah as they always put in strong teams.

"Playing in the team with Chris Sandow was an honour.

"Not every day you get to play alongside a NRL star like Chris, he has proved you can do anything you want as long as you put your mind to it and he has also showed that size doesn't matter."

Proud mum Eva Haines (nee Geia) said Chris Sandow had played for the Barracudas at the

Townsville All Blacks in honour of his late Uncle Greg Santo who came to Townsville in the 1980's to play for the Palm Island Barracuda's in the TRL comp along with his Brother Alex.

"It was actually Fred's grandmother the late Eva Geia with whom they were boarding with at the time," she said. She said the family was very proud of Fred's efforts.

"Fred jnr was also a Townsville and District Rugby League best and fairest winner in the 2009 and 2010 seasons and is certainly following in his father Fred snr's footsteps," she said.

Haines snr was a classy back who lined up with defunct Townsville club Souths and the Cardwell Axemen in the Herbert River competition in the 1980's.

"I've always told him, if he ever made it and became famous, never forget where he came from, a little Bwgcolman boy from Palm Island," his Mum said.

"His father says it's the attitude and discipline that will get you where you want to go.

"He still has to make Queensland to catch up to his father."

Seven club comp almost ready to kick-off

Palm Island's domestic rugby league competition has been scheduled to commence on Saturday, March 19, although final team numbers are dependent on clubs paying their player insurance premiums before kick-off.

The premium has to be paid under Queensland Rugby League Northern Division rules.

So far seven clubs – Butler Bay Bulls, Jets, Skipjacks, Mount Bentley Raiders, Brothers, Mundy Bay Warriors and Hornets – have flagged their readiness to battle for

premiership honours.

Palm Island Rugby League President Ili Dabea said he was under the impression clubs on remote communities would have to pay \$2300 for premiums.

"I will be talking to QRL Northern Division Divisional Manager Scott Nosworthy about that soon," he said.

He also said a meeting was held last week discussed what might be in store for 2011.

"It will be the same committee as last year until the Annual General Meeting which we hope to have before the season commences," Mr

Dabea said.

He said the Palm Island football oval was waterlogged because of recent rain and the aftermath of Cyclone Yasi. "When it dries out we will have to get it mowed to make it good to play on," he said.

The debut of a combined Palm island/Bowen side in the May Foley Shield competition is also set to be discussed with Mr Nosworthy.

A selection trial will be played between Palm Island and Bowen soon, from which a squad will be picked to compete for the Foley Shield.



MEANWHILE A CLEVER recruiting drive over this year's off-season could see Hornets Club (above) score their first ever win in the 2011 domestic Palm Island rugby league competition.

Hornets had their sign on last Sunday at the home of club president Bill Landers.

"We had 19 players sign on and have another 11 who are on the mainland waiting to do so when they get back to Palm," he said.

Players to watch in the 2011 season will be forwards Tim Asai, Lindsay Richardson, William Blanket and Maynard Ross as well as young back Daniel Geia. Last season, Hornets and Mundy Bay Warriors were the two new clubs in the competition and both gave the other five

clubs some spirited opposition at times.

Although Hornets did not win a game, they lost a number of close encounters and enjoyed a large supporter base.
