

Warrior training changing lives

Young men aged between 18 and 30 in Yarrabah are being offered a six month opportunity to learn how to turn themselves into warriors as providers and protectors, rather than aggressors.

Kapani Warrior Program Director Dr Tim White said he and his team offered a three-month course consisting of a week of intensive training alternating with a week off.

"Getting kids into the army is a by-product of what we do, what we're aimed at doing is reducing domestic violence, alcoholism and drug use," he said.

"The whole idea of the ethos is really appealing and our message seems to be getting through.

"Our pass rate, once they get through recruitment training, is 87%. So they are well and truly prepared, they understand the culture and all the things that come with it."

He said he and his team were 100% committed and they expected the same in return.

"We work with guys in the communities who are every bit alpha males but have never proved themselves," he said.

"So, our approach is about saying, 'we're going to give you an opportunity to prove yourself, you think you are so deadly, brother." "But that comes with a few catches.

"This isn't about doing a horticultural course and then going off on you own, this is about you joining us forevermore.

"This is a membership that lasts for life.

"We've got elders in our training team, guys that are 75 years old. "We got guys that are 25 years old. Once you join the military, then you are a member of a family.



"The day you decide to get out of the army, you come back as an instructor for us because you're still in the family."

Dr White said he had a long association with the Yarrabah community over 20 years and had even been rescued by one of his current participants, Jockton Fourmile, in a boating incident nearly 10 years ago. He is also the President of the Yarrabah RSL and a veteran of the Somalia conflict (United Task Force Somalia).

Mayor Ross Andrews said the Council was happy to support the program, which has been funded by Prime Minister and Cabinet.

"The Council has partnered with Kapani to try to occupy disengaged young men in our community," Mayor Ross Andrews said. "We want to build their capacity and encourage them to think about their life choices and have a career, maybe in the Armed Forces."





Free workshops tackle ongoing problems

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

Last month Wugu Nyambil partnered with the Indigenous Licensing Unit from the Department of Transport and Main Roads to assist 48 people with their licencing needs.

Held over three consecutive days, participants were able to renew existing licences, get a replacement licence, obtain an Adult Proof of Age card and some even sat their written test for their 'L' plates.

"The scheme was a great success and goes a long way to addressing a lack of public transport, a major barrier for many people in Yarrabah," Acting General Manager Darren Birt said.



"The feedback from participants was very positive, with many saying they had been waiting a long time for assistance. A big thanks to David Cone and his team from the Indigenous Licensing team for making a lot of people more independent."

Mr Birt said more than 350 people were now signed up to Wugu Nyambil.

"In our first five weeks of operation we have over 350 people in the service, with still around 250 to go," he said.
