Mayors' call for PDR funds

The Indigenous Leaders' Forum day in Cherbourg opened with a smoking ceremony and Welcome to Country, followed by dancers and a tour of the town, including Cherbourg's famous historical precinct, The Ration Shed, and their hugely successful recycling plant.

Each of the Mayors were presented with a 'shadow box', carved and painted by local workers.

The next day, in Mooloolaba, the Mayors met with the LGAQ's policy executive to discuss and work on their priorities.

From the forum, Mayor Kendall helped to lead an appeal to governments to provide funding for the Peninsula Development Road (PDR).

He said Cape communities were frustrated by the lack of common sense when deciding which stretches of road received improvements.

"Communities are confused about why different sections of the road are being fixed when others are in far worse shape," he said.

"When the roads aren't reliable, some communities have no option but to move essential supplies by helicopter.

"It would make far more sense to have a reliable road that connects the Cape and the communities along it."

Lockhart River Mayor Wayne Butcher said the PDR was critical.

"The PDR is the artery that keeps Cape communities alive and the roads off it are the difference between access or our communities being cut off from the world," Lockhart River Mayor Wayne Butcher said.

"A proper, reliable route to our communities would help unlock improvements and help us address the housing, education and health crises that are taking decades off our lives.

"A proper road would improve liveability and help with the cost of living, meaning cheaper, healthier food, reliable, affordable access to medical support and more housing would help our kids get a proper night's sleep and improve school attendance."

Northern Peninsula Area Regional Council Mayor Robert PoiPoi said the road his community relied on did not receive any Federal funding.

"With a proper road, we could lower the cost of living," Mayor Poipoi said.

"Reliable road freight is far less expensive than what we have

"We, as a community, need all sides of politics to work together towards an all-weather road."

We went on a quick look through the community, and the highlight for me was seeing their recycling plant or Materials Recovery Facility (MeRF).

It was a big eye-opener, and they take recycling from a couple of other councils in the region so it's a major source of employment and revenue for the community.

It was inspiring and I hope we can start talking about something like that for the Cape, instead of things going into landfill.

It was also good to catch up with the other Indigenous Councils from Queensland.

We spent the second day meeting in Mooloolaba, so it was a big couple of days for us. One of the things we have really appreciated was our CEO Janelle's perspective, her experience with previous ILFs and her knowledge of the other Councils.

She is in her fourth month with us, and we're happy to have her on board.

Overall, it was a good experience for all of our Councillors to be there, and we hope to make it down to the bigger LGAQ meeting with all 72 Queensland councils towards the end of the year.
