



Queensland's First Nations council leaders have signed a Queensland Indigenous Council Leaders' Accord with the State Government to guarantee local leaders a seat at the policy-making table to secure real outcomes for their communities.

The formal partnership between the State and Queensland's 17 First Nations council was signed at the conclusion of the Indigenous Leaders Forum, a precursor to the Local Government Association of Queensland's annual conference held on the Gold Coast last month.

"Since 2011, the ILF has been a valuable way for the First Nations councils to come together to share our success, discuss specific challenges and put forward issues to discuss and unpack collectively," Mayor Territa Dick said.

"Kowanyama presented to our other First Nations councils the partnership with the Arthur Beetson Foundation and the success of the future immortals tour program." She said meeting with all of the 77 local governments in Queensland was also a valuable experience.

"This conference is an amazing forum for networking, advocating and learning from peers," she said. "This year Kowanyama presented the success of our establishment of Queensland's first fully digital Indigenous Knowledge Centre (The Kowanyama Studio).

"Being asked to present a council showcase is a big deal, and we are proud to have shown off the amazing progress we are making locally in closing the digital gap.

"Our showcase was a highlight of the conference, having received so much positive feedback from our peers and stakeholders."

"We used to be guided by a Council of Elders," Prescribed Body Corporate (PBC) chair Robert

Holness said.

"It's a traditional way for the community to work through issues and come to a common agreement.

"It gives all our clan groups proper representation.

"It's a way that we can recognise and celebrate our cultural law (Lore) and pass that along to younger generations."


PBC secretary Tania Major said it was a good initiative and she was looking forward to seeing how it could benefit the community.


Mayor Territa Dick said the idea had the full support of the Kowanyama Council.
