



Mayor calls for more rights and better education after building lost to vandals

Our community needs more rights to deal with mindless, ignorant vandalism and disregard, Woorabinda Mayor Josh Weazel says.

"It needs to stop," he said. "Council is investigating what action we can take legally and advocating with government to obtain more rights for our community to deal with these matters in a culturally-appropriate way."

He said the loss of the HACC building had hurt the community greatly.

"Over its lifetime the HACC building served multiple functions," he said.

"It's been our preschool, an elders and community meeting place, hosted health aged and community care programs and, most recently, a place for our artists who had painted the building with their beautiful artwork only weeks before."

"The artists used the building to produce work which is shown and sold at our Woorabinda-owned gallery in Duaranga and at a recent exhibition in Springsure to mark Reconciliation Week."

He said the messages to children and their parents was clear.

"For those children who have committed this arson attack on our building, your actions have affected the broader community who cannot utilise this building anymore," he said.

"To those parents, and all

parents if you have accepted responsibility for your child's action, as shameful as it is, we are grateful.

"To those parents and families who have shown their ignorance by lying and covering for their children, you can be assured your actions have been noticed."

"Our services are not responsible for these acts, we ask everyone to take on board their obligations and responsibilities as parents and to provide ongoing and consistent education to children at home – we need to teach them what is wrong and what is not acceptable to us as a community."

MEANWHILE Woorabinda Art Centre Manager Nickeema Williams says the art group's work will go on.

"The arts is very adaptable, and given the importance of what we do to peoples' wellbeing and mental health, we have to be able to work around whatever problems arise," she said.

"It was really important to quickly find an alternative venue for our artists so they could continue to work on their art in a positive way."

"We'll be working from the Opal Hall and Shed Space until something more permanent is set up."

An upgrade to our CBD area will good for the community as the area is a popular meeting place and will look good once turf and a small garden is completed, WASC Works Manager Neville 'Dooley' Perkins says.

He said it will also help with the storm water runoff as the new grated drains will let water clear faster.

"WASC are also putting in new seating arrangements in the area," he said.

"The new gym will be ready to go in the next two weeks, operating hours are still a work in progress but this will also be a great asset for the community once it's all done.

"Six new accommodation cabins, given to WASC by the State Government, are almost installed out at Black Boy Station after their relocation from the Rockhampton Ring Road area.

"WASC have restumped them and are connecting all the

services, and new awning and patios will also be completed in the next couple of weeks.

"These are all self-contained and again, will be a valued asset for the WASC."

He said there was plenty of work to go on with later this year as two new three bedroom houses are expected to be started on Freeman Street.

"WASC are also tendered for three new education house on the corner of Mimosa Creek Road and Munns Drive, negotiation are happening and these we hope to make a start on those in July/August," he said.

All projects were funded by the State/Federal Government through Works for Queensland (W4Q) funding.
