The PI Early Years Reference Group (PI EYRG) organised a team from the Children Development Services (CDS) to let parents and service providers know how they can help their children when they come to the island last month.

The team included a Speech, Occupational and Physio Therapist, and a social worker (who wasn't able to be there for that first meeting).

The team explained their roles and aspects of the work, which included:

- How children could be referred
- Confidentiality and privacy rules
- Contact and what happens on the actual assessment day
- Where reports go and what they are used for

The CDS team have been visiting the Island since 2016, when they changed their mode of delivery from therapy to assessment which could be done in a more open setting, such as in the playground, in the yard, on the verandah or in a quiet area where Early Childhood resources are plentiful.

Feedback from parents and participants included:

"The information session was very educational to understand the areas CDS work in and how they work amongst their clients."

"The information session was very useful, it was good to understand the process and what disabilities or delays CDS can identify. I recommend it to parents in the community."

"The session with the CDS was helpful because it answered questions about some of their processes. I also learned that the physiotherapist is able to see children with a variety of different issues up to the age of 16. I am looking forward to more informal sessions like this which help us to collaborate for our children."

"It was good sitting in a very comfortable informal atmosphere 'chatting with service providers for our kids. The food was great too."

The CDS team visits about seven times a year, depending on availability and demand.

The Early Years Reference Group will advertise their visits on their members' social media platforms and local newsletters.

The next information session the Group will coordinate is a FASD forum on Thursday 5 June, which is aimed at local paraprofessional and professional personnel, but anyone is welcome to attend.
