



Getting hands-on with new tech and learning digital skills to support connection, creativity and culture was all happening at the State Library of Queensland's (SLQ's) digital workshops at the Indigenous Knowledge Centre (IKC) last week.

From digital design to setting up live streams for funerals, the free workshops provided practical tools to meet Palm Island's needs.

Learning how to create artwork using the IKC's new tablets and sublimation printer was a huge hit, with everyone taking home their own custom-designed T-shirt.

The workshops were part of SLQ's Growing IKCs project, which supports 16 First Nations councils to build their IKC digital capacity through access to equipment, digital skills programs and training for staff.

IKC Coordinator Regina James said the workshops built digital confidence and sparked ideas for local applications.

"The workshops were informative and engaging and wellpaced for all who attended to learn and gain new tech skills in research, especially family history," she said.

The IKC will continue to offer regular digital activities, including the chance to fly drones and create 360° videos—perfect for the Palm Island ranger team and local storytellers.

The Growing IKCs project was supported by the Department of Customer Services, Open Data and Small and Family Business through its Digital Inclusion program.

The visit was facilitated by the Mingga Mingga rangers, led by coordinator Natalie Friday, with a Welcome to Country offered by Traditional Owner and MEC Executive Officer Richard Cassady.

Palm Island's Orange Sky was the second remote service out of 21 laundry facilities offered across 18 communities in Queensland, the Northern Territory and Western Australia.

Richard and Ranger Eb Oui were the first two employees of Orange Sky when they came to Palm Island in September 2018.

The Board joined several shifts of the service, meeting current Orange Sky service assistants Trenton Bligh and Cecilia Wotton along the way.

"It was so good to have the Board visit Palm Island," Judith said.

"I'm really grateful they took the time to visit to meet the team and some community members who use the service.

"It's valuable that they understand the importance of community-run services and the challenges some people face in accessing essential things like washing machines.

"It was great to show them the impact the locally run service has on the community."

The CFC is now back in full swing, open each day in the blue building.
