Mayors lead on new Cabinet Accord

Queensland's First Nations council leaders have signed an agreement with the State Government to guarantee local leaders a seat at the policy-making table to secure real outcomes for their communities.

Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey, who signed the Accord with Queensland Queensland Ministers Fiona Simpson (Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Partnerships) & Ann Leahy (Local Government) and Lockhart River Mayor Wayne Butcher with LGAQ President and Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett (pictured).

"This is a really important

step forward not just for us but for the next generation in our communities in that we've now got the opportunity to be seated at the table to raise our issues," Mr Lacey said.

"It's about liveability and our economic future and prosperity and determining our own future.

"This is a demonstration from

the State Government that it has the appetite and the willingness to sit at the table with us and hear directly from the third level of government in the state."

Ms Simpson said the agreement was about, "ensuring that there is an overcoming of the tyranny of distance, but also the barriers of bureaucracy".





Nearly two and a half kilometres of beaches and somewhere between 1000 and 2000 kilograms of rubbish were collected in a massive clean-up earlier this month, Palm Island's Minggamingga Land and Sea Rangers have reported.

Coordinator Natalie Friday said the final weight was yet to be confirmed.

She said the rubbish included bike and scooter frames, signs, batteries, glass and plastic bottles, aluminium cans, tyres, fishing lines and rope, net remnants and general household waste.

"The cleanup spanned six beaches and was a collaborative community effort involving St Michael's School, Bwgcolman School, the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council and the Palm Island Community Company, including their Youth Services, Men's Group (Diversionary), Ferdy's Haven teams and ourselves," she said.

"Thank you to everyone involved.

"It was a strong effort for our very first cleanup.

"Lots of lessons were learned and, as always, there is room for improvement."

She said she hoped the next one would be even better.

"Special thanks to PICC for providing water, fruit, marquees and tables, and to the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council for providing the food, water and barbecue.

"Most importantly, thank you to everyone for bringing their spirit, effort and presence, showing our community how working together in harmony benefits us all.

"This reminds us progress is built quietly through steady effort and each act of contribution strengthens the foundation of our community.

"We honour the work, the learning, and the unity we share and move forward with gratitude, purpose and hope for the future."





Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council has formally welcomed nine new local staff with a Code of Conduct and Safety Induction held in the Council Chambers last week.

The new starters join teams across water and waste operations, civil and open space, administration and community infrastructure.

Mayor Alf Lacey said the appointments highlighted a depth of skill and commitment in the Palm Island community.

"We're excited to be able to tap into the incredible talent we have right here on Palm," Mayor Lacey said.

"Our people have the skills, knowledge, and drive to make a real impact.

"These new appointments show that when opportunities are available, our community steps up, and Council is proud to support that."

Three new Labourer positions have also been created to support key community infrastructure projects — two of those dedicated to the construction of the new Waste and

Recycling Facility and one to assist with the Palm Island Walking Trails project.

Both initiatives will deliver lasting improvements to essential services, local amenities and employment opportunities for Palm Island residents.

Council will continue to focus on developing its local workforce through training, mentoring, and succession planning, ensuring that opportunities for growth and leadership remain accessible to Palm Island residents.
