Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council Mayor Alf Lacey said the project was just the beginning for Palm Island.

experiences," he said.



Welcome Emma!

New Chief Executive Officer Emma Bradbury brings more than 30 years of leadership experience, with a background spanning local government, human services and regional development, to the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council.



Emma accepted her new role in September, after her initial appointment as Interim CEO in late July.

Known for her steady, values-led approach to governance and engagement, Emma's career has been dedicated to serving rural, regional and remote communities across Australia.

Since 2012, she has worked with and for local government nationwide — including as an elected member in Campaspe Shire in regional Victoria, CEO of the Murray Darling Association, representing more than 100 councils across the Basin region; Interim CEO at Napranum Aboriginal Shire Council and CEO of Barkly Regional Council in the Northern Territory.

Emma said she was immediately struck by the vision and commitment of Mayor Lacey and the Council, and by the depth of local talent across staff and the broader community.

Inspired by that experience, she applied for the permanent role and said she felt privileged to have been selected.

Born in Mount Isa and raised in and around Townsville, Emma raised her own family in Ingham and Charters Towers.

Before entering the world of local government, she worked as a business owner, educator and advocate for regional communities.

She holds a Bachelor of Social Science from James Cook University, a Graduate Diploma in Education, and is a Graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.



Proud Palm Islander Georgia Clay has grown from a shy, softly spoken teenager to a confident cultural leader, who has embraced every opportunity that's come her way since becoming a boarder at NRL Cowboys House late last year.

Driven by her passion for dance and cultural identity, Georgia has founded an all-girls Indigenous dance group that has grown from a handful of participants to more than a dozen performers.

"We named the dance group Indigenous Sistas to celebrate our culture and connect us 'as one'," Georgia said.

"I had the idea, and asked Miss Rae if she could help me get things started and then more girls kept wanting to join.

"There are a lot of girls from different communities from across Australia and through different movements and dance we can come together and share our culture with each other and audiences.

"I'm very happy I came to the House because they support you to do better things.

"Once I came here, I have become more positive, strong, brave and wanting to do all these incredible things I never did before."

The Indigenous Sistas first performed in front of their NRL Cowboys House peers at the Sorry Day event, then hundreds of family members and stakeholders at the NAIDOC celebration in September, before being invited to perform at Queensland Country Bank Stadium as part of NRL Indigenous Round.

"I feel very proud and happy that we did that," Georgia said. "It felt powerful.

"I felt like a strong, young Indigenous woman representing her culture. I'm very proud and I know my family are very proud too."
