It's your Census, make it count!

A large team of people have been working around Palm Island this week as part of the 2016 Australian Census.

The official Census date is August 9 and one of the Palm Island team leaders is Zina Prior.

“I have been in Brisbane for almost a week doing training and we will have 30 Census workers getting around Palm,” she said. “Also in Brisbane also were

representatives from the various Aboriginal and TSI communities around Queensland.”

The Census of Population and Housing is Australia's largest statistical collection undertaken by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS).

The information you provide in the Census helps estimate Australia's population, which is used to distribute government funds and plan services for your community housing, transport, education, industry, hospitals and the environment.

Ministerial champions to back Indigenous communities

Queensland's Indigenous councils have welcomed an announcement by the Palaszczuk Government which will see individual Ministers appointed as champions for their communities.

Palm Island Mayor and LGAQ Policy Executive indigenous representative Alf Lacey said he was hopeful the new approach could improve direct communication between indigenous communities and the political leaders of the state.

“Ministers too often learn about our communities from public servants and aboriginal experts based in Brisbane,” he said.

“Even with their good intentions, these people do not always know what is needed or what programs will work in our communities.

This new approach will give the Ministers an opportunity to learn straight from the horse's mouth – from democratically leaders who live and work in the community.”

Acting LGAQ President Townsville Mayor Jenny Hill praised the newly announced Ministerial Government Champions' Program

as a good start toward removing barriers to tangible change.

“On behalf of our indigenous councils the LGAQ has long been calling for greater direct dialogue between the political leaders of councils and those of the state,” she said.

“The measure of success of this initiative will be in the results it effects – results like improvements in health outcomes or enhanced economic development opportunities within these communities.”

The Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council came to the rescue, however, and obtained the use of a large white tent and three large heaters which made the comfort zone perfect.

The theme of this NAIDOC event was ‘Songlines’ and there was plenty of entertainment throughout the night.

Local band Mother’s Dust kicked things off as guests were welcomed by Mayor Alf Lacey.

“This is a dinner where we can all meet in talk and we

don’t do enough of that on Palm – this was your night,” Cr Lacey said.

“It went really well, the response has been very good and Council has really appreciated that.”

During a presentation guests were shown some of the work and which has been done around the Island and what is to come.

MC for the night was Cr Deniece Geia who also blessed the event.

Elders were recognised and everybody had a great feed.

There was also a fireworks display.

Comedian Sean Choolburra’s recorded presentation was a hit with everybody and the laughter was great.

A special citizen’s

presentation was made to popular and disabled resident John Walsh.

The entertainment then included the Yidinji Descendants Dance Group, the Mathias Oui Torres Strait descendants of Darnley/ Badu and Moa Islands, Pacific Flowers, One Man Army (Kevin Wilson), Delena Oui jnr and the main act Justin Wellington.

Many in the audience were still there when the event ended at midnight.

Police also deserve a special mention and as guests left offered to give them a free breath test to determine whether they were under the legal limit to drive.

Overall it was a night people will be talking about for months.

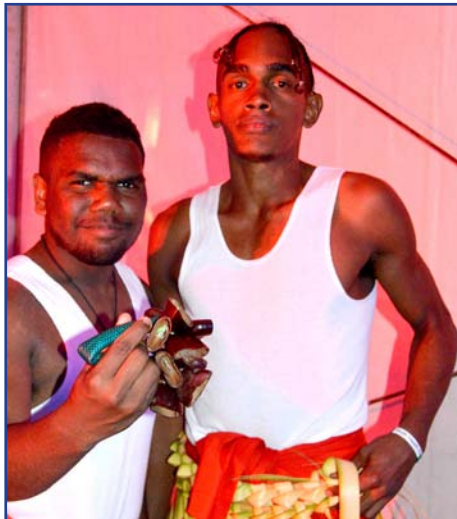
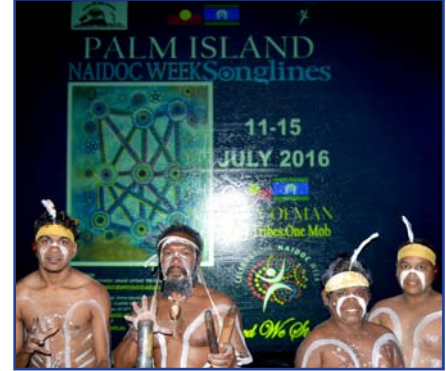

Trainer Ray Dennis said as many as six could make the 700km road journey to the central Queensland capital.

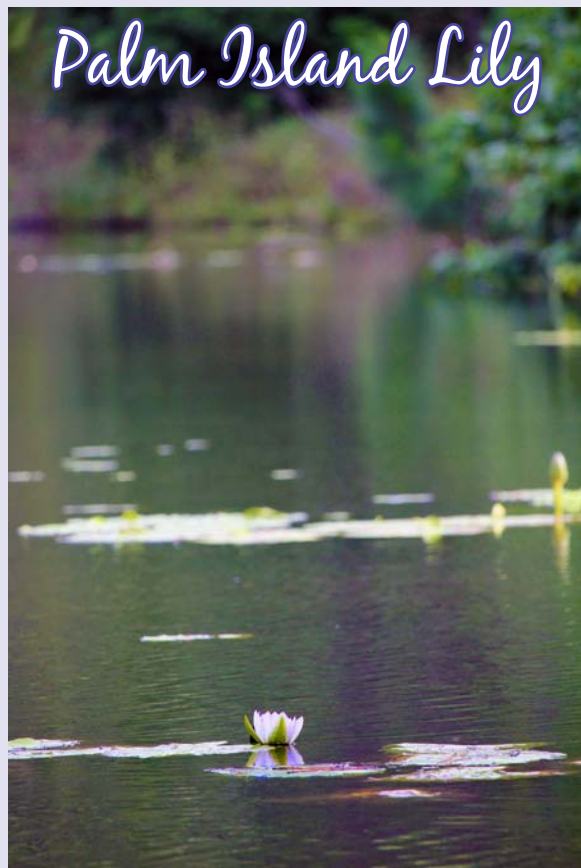
"There has been a lot training at the PCYC Gym on Palm including some youngsters," he said.
