Harry has just completed a work placement with Regional Support Services in Gosford, gaining valuable case work experience with the Indigenous Youth Justice Program.


As one of seven Singapore Alumni Scholarship recipients awarded in 2019, Harry has used the support from his scholarship to meet his financial commitments like paying rent and travelling to work placements without the need to juggle work and study commitments during his degree.

"It's hard not having the direct support of family around you and financially it's very difficult, I've been very lucky in securing some support through the Singapore Alumni Scholarship," he said.

"Ultimately my aspiration is to unconsciously influence and inspire others in my community to attend school and university, and empower them to shine and pursue their ambitions and dreams and make them a reality.

## We need to stand firm – Mayor Sam

"We are living in unprecedented times," newly elected Mayor Mislam Sam has told the Palm Island Voice, just minutes after finishing yet another a Local Disaster Management Group meeting yesterday.



"We are all a bit overloaded at the moment, I'm feeling everyone's concerns," he said.

"This is uncharted territory for all of us and I know the emotional toll it's having on every individual in our community.

"We need to stand firm." He said the COVID-19 virus had huge implications for the Palm Island community.

"If it was to ever get here, we don't know where we'll be," he said.

"We must make sure we do the right thing because these are critical times."

He said he was aware the new boating and fishing rules were particularly difficult.

"These times are hard, there is no fishing from boats," he said.

"But it's got to be said those who are doing the wrong thing are jeopardising our community.

"That's the reason those laws are in place, we need to have a real hard look at ourselves because if this virus gets here we are going to be in a very serious situation.

"Those laws stopping us from going out have been put in place by national and state governments and yes, this Council will take a strong line on all of it.

"I know we can't get in to fish, I know the emotional toll, I know the health and diet implications, especially with the high cost of living here, but if we remain vigilant we'll see this through and we'll be out there in the water again as soon as we can be.

"It's also worth remembering there may be more fish stocks in the sea as a result of this break, if we can just hold off for a little longer."

He said he and his colleagues,

the first time, had taken on a baptism of fire.

"We just need to just follow the advice from our National and State governments and Medical Officers, and if we do the right thing we will hopefully come through this thing untouched," he said.

"Just do the right thing.

"Let's just take the advice given to us, we might suffer now but it means living the rest of our lives free and healthy if we just do the right things now."

He said he was looking forward getting beyond the current crisis and getting back to business as

"If we do get out of this and we can function with some kind of normality in place, we'll be back to trying to grow our local economy, but that's all I can really say on that matter for now," he said.

(commencing Monday 20 April)




All students are expected to come to school

### If you are stranded in Townsville...

If you are a Palm Island resident and wish to return to Palm Island you need to undertake a 14-day self-quarantine/isolation before you are allowed to come back.

Council and the LDMG have been working with the Queensland Government to identify a monitored process and location for this to happen.

To ensure we are aware of the number of people who are impacted by this situation, and to assist in identifying

a satisfactory location, it is requested that you register through the Department of Housing and Public Works by calling one of the following:

You will need to advise the names of people in your family wishing to return, a phone number and the address of where you are currently located.

Once the Council has this information, and a decision is made, you will be contacted with further advice.
