Mayor 'honoured' to be elected to statewide local government exec

Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey has been elected as a member of the Local Government Association of Queensland's (LGAQ's) Policy Executive.

Mr Lacey is only the second Indigenous person to hold such a position within Queensland's peak body for local government across the entire state.

LGAQ President Paul Bell (*pictured above on the left with Mr Lacey*) said Mr Lacey's membership was highly valued.

"Alf has demonstrated tremendous leadership in his own community and, as the executive's only indigenous member, will be an important cog in the representative wheel," he told the *Palm Island Voice*. "In order to serve councils across the state it is vital that we embrace diverse views.

"Importantly, we value the local knowledge that members of our policy executive bring to the table. "It ensures we strike an important balance when it comes to acting on member-wide and external viewpoints as we go about the business of deciding on policies, practices, management and operations of LGAQ."

Mr Lacey said he was honoured to be elected to the position.

"Certainly it is a great honour to serve at that



executive level, most importantly so I can help ensure issues for Indigenous communities across Queensland are adequately addressed," he said.

"It means we continue to have a voice, particularly at that mainstream level, so I'm pleased to take on this role.

"When it comes to Indigenous Councils' issues and particularly community issues, LGAQ can certainly help with lobbying government on our behalf, which I'm certain will become a key tool in helping us to elevate our issues. "I have also had overwhelming support from all Indigenous councils in Queensland, so I thank them for that and for having confidence in me. "I'll serve all our member councils with pride but will also work to ensure that our issues are brought to the forefront while I'm there, and to the utmost of my abilities."

'Local laws' to replace former by-laws

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council has adopted a set of laws known as 'local laws' to replace what were previously known as 'by-laws' in the community.

Mayor Alf Lacey said under the and conversation. new Local Government Act the new laws were formally adopted earlier this month. Council enlisted the services of Local Government consultant Vince Corbin to assist with reviewing and packaging the new laws.

"He's put together the Local Laws for the Palm Island Shire Council, which was adopted at last week's Council meeting on Monday," Mr Lacey said. did attend a meeting yesterday with community elders and Justice Group members to show them the Local Law instruments we've adopted and what will be put outforcommunityconsultation

"So the community now has an opportunity to sit down and figure out if there's anything else they need to want to go into them.

"One of the things elders have raised with me is the question of a curfew.

"My response to that is if they feel strongly about curfew they can put a submission up to Council, which we would welcome so we can talk about whether we should make some kind of curfew part of our Local Law.

"No doubt that needs community consultation and it has to be put up around the community to give everyone

an opportunity to agree or disagree."

He said the 'new' laws were much shorter and easier to read than the previous bylaws but were, on the whole, almost the same.

things "Thev talk about like animal control, parks, camping fees and other things in the community," he said.

"We will put the electronic copies of the laws on the Council website, for those who have got internet access, and there will be hard copies available at the Community Justice Group office, **Indigenous** Knowledge Centre (library) and at the Council offices."

PALM Island's Coolgaree Catering Services is in the process of producing master chefs, some of whom are already working at the new chicken shop and bakery

A special group of 18 locals are now Class II and III hospitality graduates after starting their courses in July last year.

Under the leadership and tutorial of Chef and Manager of Coolgaree Catering Services, former Sydney chef Danielle Sinn, 13 students have secured permanent jobs, traineeships and or apprenticeships at Coolgaree's new Country Fried Chicken shop and new Bakery which opened at CDEP headquarters late last month.

They are already preparing top quality food, as the banquet of food at the Palm island PCYC for the hundreds of locals who attended a farewell to three Catholic nuns, showed.

Word was the presentation and taste of the food was equal to any top mainland restaurant and guests were going back for second and third helpings, such was its popularity.

The workers have also had national publicity in the *Koori Mail* newspaper about their efforts. "I took up this challenge with a hope that I can start to educate Palm Island youngsters, through their elder family members to start eating healthy, cooking at home and living

well," Ms Sinn said.

"All the trainees have been catering now for nearly a year together and do all the catering jobs for Palm, including many official visits by politicians & high profile people such as Cathy Freeman & Kevin Rudd to name a few.

"They range in age from 18 to 48 and are very proud, as are their families of having a job, wearing a uniform and having a brighter future. Two of the apprentices – Peggy Palm

Island and Eunice Webster – are being taken to Sydney in July as a reward for their hard work to attend the Sydney Food and Wine Show.

"They are to have classes with four Master Chef program chefs from the show and are very excited."

Danielle said the next Hospitality course was starting this month (June) and another 20 or so eager budding chefs were signed up already.

"So hopefully we will have no shortage of indigenous chefs coming up the ranks in the North Queensland cooking world," she said.

"We also wanted to remind people that court week is every CDEP Week and that anyone sentenced to Murri Court should remember it's very important for them to come and report to the Justice Group

before their next due court date, so a cultural report can be done up for them," she said.

"Also, every off-Court week we are doing court procedures training, with adults and school students (community education) on the Wednesday in the courtroom.

"Anyone wanting to know things about court proceedings and those kinds of things should come along to those sessions."

"Our last CJG meeting was held last Thursday 9th June 2011."

- · Thursday 8 December


Meetings start at 9.30am for CJG members, training (JP trainings, court procedures etc) goes through until 12pm for lunch.

"At 1pm on those days we also have network meetings with a representative from a non-government or government organisation in regards to justice issues, and then after that we have our normal monthly meetings," she said.

"I hope we can keep in touch with the Palm

Island Voice from now on so the Palm Island Community, as well as other communities across the board, will be more aware of what we are doing here."

The Justice Group has a flyer, now available from their offices and from various places across the Island, which says they are very proud to be part of what was the first Justice Group in Queensland.



"It was our very own Palm Island Justice Group that became the first group in Queensland through a Pilot Program, and that were instrumental through a very special group of Elders, who wanted to see a positive change, as well as have more voice in their community," the flyer says.

"This bought a lot of RESPECT back into the community, where the Elders were finally recognised not only by the community itself but by the State Government bodies at that time.

Townsville hosts 'Vibe Alive' for students



Students from St Michael's Catholic School, Bwgcolman State and the Palm Island High campus were amongst thousands who attended the Vibe Alive Festival at the Townsville Showgrounds earlier this month.

Vibe Alive is a fun, two-day festival for all school-aged Australians which celebrates Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.

The festival offered two days of extreme fun with dancing, rapping, singing, painting and sport and featured guest artists including Luke Carroll, Nathan Foley, Casey Donovan and Gail Mabo.

Palm students with swags and sleeping bags were kitted out and ready to camp the night

in one of the halls.

Organisers said students from 42 schools attended with more than 200 from eight of those sleeping the night.

Vibe Alive is funded by the Australian Government's Community Festivals for Education Engagement program, designed to encourage school attendance, retention and healthy lifestyles for all young Australians, and in particular Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

After a successful recruitment campaign launched in the early part of this year Paramedic Gemma Armit and local resident Robert Blackley have been selected to complete a student cadetship program with the QAS here on Palm Island, writes QAS OIC Ian Day.

In three years they could be fully-fledged paramedics Filling Gemma Armit's spot is Cert III officer Brances Millar, who comes to us from the Mackay region. She will be doing her Cert IV studies here.

Brances has been with the QAS for four years as a patient transport officer, is in a de facto relationship with a paramedic from North Mackay and loves fishing and camping.

She is Torres Strait Island (from Darnley Island) and is looking forward to meeting all her family that are here on Palm Island.

We welcome her to the team, which now comprises two paramedics – Greg and myself – and five Indigenous ambulance attendants – Billy, William, Gemma, Brances and Robert.



PALM Island riders are encouraged to nominate for the Mungalla Station Bull Spectacular Rodeo to be held on September 17.

Mungalla Station is near Ingham and the rodeo action will be run by Townsville man John Moss of Bucko Billy Rodeo.

Palm Island's Pauline Shortjoe has also assisted with organising the event, expected to draw hundreds of Palm Island people for on-site camping and festivities.

The event will be an alternative to the Palm Island rodeo which was to be held at Charters Towers in May but was cancelled due to high costs and other unforeseen circumstances. Mr Moss they were expecting 70 riders.

"We will have 20 riders in the open bull ride, 20 in the novice bull ride, 15 in the juvenile

and 15 youngsters in the calf ride," Mr Moss said.

He said there were already nine nominations for the calf ride with some from Palm Island. "Fliers will soon be put around North Queensland and there will be some on Palm Island," Mr Moss said.



"David is just 16 years old and his last three opponents were aged 18, 20 and 27," he said. Mr Dennis said since he had been on Palm Island his boxers has tasted much success.


"It is not that I am a hot shot trainer but I just seem to have the ability to select the boxers with the natural ability to put in the ring to box," he said.

Astute Mr Dennis said he had trained many Palm boxers in

the past with the ability to represent Australia.

"Whilst they have only been registered with the Queensland Sunstate Amateur Boxing League they never had a chance," he said. "Now our best boxers are also registered with the Australian Boxing Association and can take part in trials to represent Australia," he said.

One boxer currently training hard, and who Mr Dennis expects big things of, is 16-year-old Vernon Geia.



"Vernon will be hard to beat at 81kg junior level," he said. Two more young Palm boxers are ready to fight at coming tournaments.

Harry Friday is a 13-year-old great grandson of the late and great Jack Hassen whilst Chris Johnson is a grandson of Colin Gibson.

"Jack Hassen and Colin Gibson were two of the best boxers to come from Palm Island," Mr Dennis said. Jack Hassen was regarded as one of Australia's better fighters as an Australian lightweight champion.


His record stood at 36 fights for 29 wins, one of his losses being to the champion American Freddie Dawson.

Meanwhile Mr Dennis is hoping to have a big team representing Palm Island at the Queensland Gold Gloves tournament to be held at Cairns on June 24 and 25.

Palm boxers have performed well at previous Golden Gloves.

"We need a sponsor to pay for the trip which will cost about \$3,000 for boat tickets, bus hire and accommodation," Mr Dennis said.

PIRL PLAYER PROFILE: STEVE LOWATTA

LOYALTY to the Barracudas has earned star Hornets back Stephen Lowatta great respect on Palm island.

The 26-year-old Lowatta has been playing with the Barracudas since age 15 and is a quality five eighth, with the same number 6 position Johnathan Thurston has with the North Queensland Cowboys.

"There was no local competition here on Palm when I left school so I played with the Barracudas when Lex Wotton was a winger and Fred Haines senior a centre," he said. Born on Palm, Stephen attended Bwgcolman Primary and later St Anne and St Joseph's School in Townsville.

Employed as a mechanic by the Palm island Aboriginal Shire Council, Lowatta also played with Brothers Club in Townsville in 2007.

Lowatta had been with family club Mount Bentley Raiders for the past few seasons and joined Hornets after Raiders didn't enter a team in 2011.

It has been a big month for Lowatta who is one of the most exciting backs on Palm Island.

On May 7 at Ayr he shone for the Barracudas when they played an exciting 24-all draw with Bowen/Collinsville in a Foley Shield selection trial.

After that great form Lowatta was picked to play for the combined Palm Island/Bowen side which competed at the Foley Shield from May 20 to 22.

Lowatta impressed and held his own against the best footballers in North Queensland.

"I really like playing for the Barracudas and representing Palm Island," he said.

In round five of the Palm domestic comp on June 1, Lowatta starred for Hornets who narrowly lost a cliffhanger game 28-26 to Mundy Bay Warriors.

Lowatta scored two tries and booted two goals for a personal tally of 12 points – signalling loud and clear he is a danger man to opposition sides whenever he plays.
